

## High School Lesson A Escape Room Facilitator Guide

Direction Lock	When reading the paragraph, students should notice there are capital letters that should not be capitalized. These letters spell out "consumer." Students then follow his activities for the day. Only the activities in which he is a consumer of copyrighted work should be used. The first one is the starting position, then list the directions to the next consumer activities. (Instagram, YouTube, eBook, TikTok, Spotify, Netflix)
	Solution: up left down down left
	SUMMARY STATEMENT: <i>Remember, sometimes we are consumers of copyrighted works created by others, and sometimes we are creators.</i>
Word Lock	Decode the rebus puzzle to reveal, "Copyright concepts are included in this supreme law of the land."
	Solution: constitution
	SUMMARY STATEMENT: Remember, the Constitution authorizes Congress to enact copyright laws–so Congress passed the Copyright Act, which establishes the copyright framework for the United States.
Number Lock	In the paragraph, there are four numbers in numerical form. Add them up to get the total. (2014, 2013, 2, 88)
	Solution: 4117
	SUMMARY STATEMENT: <i>Remember, copyright allows artists to decide</i> when and how to make their work available to the public.
Color Lock	Match the four sets of words into their appropriate categories (subjects of popular derivative works, situations that favor fair use, covered by copyright, not covered by copyright). Put the colored banners in alphabetical order.
	Solution: orange purple green blue
