<p>Color Lock</p>	<p>Students will match the five items with the appropriate term. By blending the paired colors in numerical order, they will find the solution (#1 is red and pairs with fair use-yellow. Red and yellow make orange. Orange is the first color) Fair use is used twice.</p> <p>Solution: orange purple purple green orange</p>
<p>Word Lock</p>	<p>Students will likely need to review the video or even search for the Creative Commons symbols and their meanings. The colors going across the top and bottom give the order from left to right. First, match the symbol to its associated descriptor. Students should then notice each descriptor has an italic letter or letters. They should record the italic letters in order to solve the clue. (For example, the first color is red and the red symbol matches with the bottom descriptor. In the descriptor text there is a letter “f” in the third to last word that is italicized. Students should record that letter.)</p> <p>Solution: fair use</p> <p>SUMMARY STATEMENT: <i>“There are several different Creative Commons licenses—make sure you check what’s required when you use a Creative Commons work.”</i></p>
<p>Color Lock</p>	<p>There are factors to consider when evaluating a fair use situation. The following clues are significant: amount and substance, purpose and character, nature of the original, and effect on the market (the other three in the clue are red herrings). The appropriate phrases should be put in alphabetical order by the first letter of each, and the shirt colors provide the solution.</p> <p>Solution: purple orange green red</p>
<p>Shape Lock</p>	<p>The image outlines the four factors to consider with respect to fair use. Students will notice a letter in each descriptor that is in italics. Unscrambling the letters they will find the word “fair”. Going in that order they will find a shape on each part of the scale. F is in effect on the market - the shopping cart is a rectangle, etc.</p> <p>Solution: rectangle circle triangle diamond</p>
